My name is Alyssa Offenheim, and I am currently in my fourth year of the Bachelor of Public Administration (BPA) program, specializing in Management and concurrently completing a certificate in Intermediate French Proficiency. My journey to this program began in high school, where I had ambitions to serve the public as a Crown attorney. At the time, this was the only career path that I understood to match my passion for law, equity, and human rights, and I believed that the BPA program would be the best program to prepare me for law school. Little did I know that the courses I would take in my first and second year in the BPA would change my perspective on everything – from where I wanted to go, who I wanted to be, and the type of change that I wanted to make. By the end of the first half of my undergrad - during which I took courses in economics, politics, law, and governance – I realized that the best fit for me would be a career in the public service.

My experience at York has been eye-opening and perfectly suited to my appetite for learning about absolutely everything. The BPA program is such a great fit for students who want to engage in theoretical learning from a variety of disciplines because of the mixture of courses offered and the opportunity to focus in on certain policy areas. Moreover, the program has offered invaluable experiential learning experiences such as AP/PPAS 4310/20 3.0 Program Evaluation I and II, wherein students deliver program evaluations to real-life clients. During my fourth year, I had the chance to work with a team on a real-life research project evaluating the TTC's Public Art Program, providing me with experience securing ethical review,

developing research methodologies, and managing a project. I also had the opportunity to complete a practicum at the Modernization Division of the Ministry of the Attorney General through the AP/PPAS 4995 6.0 Practicum in Public Administration course, where I applied my classroom project management skills to the workplace. These experiences, alongside the support and motivation of professors, solidified my interest in furthering my knowledge of the field, leading me to sign on to the first full-time offering of the Master of Public Policy, Administration and Law (MPPAL) program at York University starting in Fall 2019.

If I could offer advice to first year students, it would be to take advantage of the free credit space in your schedule to expose yourself to the subjects you are passionate about so that you know where you want to make a difference when you graduate. I would also suggest joining the Public Policy and Administration Student Association (PPASA) as early as possible, as this network of peers will stimulate your time at York with networking events and career panels. Your experience in this program is entirely what you make it, and fortunately, there are a hundred different ways to make it your own.



York University marks Refugee Rights Day, April 4th

York University will host a celebration of Refugee Rights Day in Canada on Thursday, April 4. The event will also acknowledge the efforts of York-based refugee sponsors and students engaged in refugee issues through as well as York's long-standing <u>World University Service Canada (WUSC) local committees</u> and the University's <u>Syria Response and Refugee Initiative (SRRI)</u>, which is a Syrian refugee resettlement and education project (2015-19) hosted by the <u>Centre for Refugee Studies</u>. (SSRI is concluding this month).

The day holds special significance for the two York undergraduate student panellists who have been heavily engaged in refugee support and human rights advocacy. "Refugee Rights Day is an extremely important event to me because, I am a newcomer to Canada who arrived two years ago and I know how difficult it could be for refugees to integrate into a new country, adapt to a new culture and to have their rights and opinions respected," says Dommar. "This day is also very special as it allows me to reflect on all my experiences and my contributions to the (SRRI) project."

"As a Student Refugee Program Coordinator at <u>WUSC Keele Committee</u>, it is important for the community to provide safe space for refugee youth on campus, as it makes the refugee youth feel safe and welcomed," says Ashfaque. "Working with the <u>Refugees Welcome Here! Campaign</u>, it clearly sends the message that we are supporting refugees and working strongly alongside them," she adds. "The campaign advocates for welcoming communities through fighting fiction with facts and publicly advocating for fairness for refugees."

"We commemorate Refugee Rights Day in Canada each year to reflect on the significance and importance of 'everyone's' most fundamental human rights as found in Section 7 of our *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms*, which states that everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of the person," says McLaughlin College Head and Professor James Simeon, who will deliver welcoming and opening remarks along with Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies Interim Dean JJ McMurtry. "This meant 'everyone' who is on Canadian soil, that is, all persons were protected by the Charter, including, refugees," adds Simeon.

"Given the asylum seekers currently walking across the US-Canada border to make a claim (not at ports of entry), the importance of the Singh decision and its protections 35 years on is key," adds Centre for Refugee Studies Director Jennifer Hyndman.

"Though there remains a tremendous amount still to be done in a world where the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees estimates there are a record 68.5 million people displaced globally, and there are few spots for resettlement, it's an honour and it is important to mark the contributions our sponsor groups have made, as well as the <u>Keele and Glendon WUSC committees</u> whose work will continue," says Carlaw. "It's especially important to thank and recognize the many student groups and leaders who are positively leading the way and will be doing so for years to come.

"York's event is also part of a series events organized by the Toronto Refugee Rights Month Planning Committee, a group organizing and highlighting <u>a month-long series of events</u>. At the coalition's request, <u>the City of Toronto has agreed to recognize April as Refugee Rights Month</u>.

The Urbanization, gender and the global south: a transformative knowledge network (GenUrb) project is a SSHRC funded six-year comparative research project with 35 feminist urban academics and activists based in 7 cities in the global south (Cairo, Cochabamba, Georgetown, Ibadan, Mumbai, Ramallah, and Shanghai) under the academic direction of Professor Linda Peake, Director of the City Institute at York University. The aim of the program is to investigate the gendered implications of urbanization to advance understanding of how the relationship between poverty and inequality in these seven cities is reconstituting gender relations and gendered rights to the city.

Qualifications - The ideal student must be familiar with Guyana and speak Guyanese Creole.

You may be pursuing a BA or Graduate degree, have experience in an academic environment, and familiarity with feminist issues of the urban would be a bonus. You should have excellent research and writing skills, be proficient with MS Word (and other computer software programs), able to work independently, be detail oriented, have great time management skills, and able to maintain confidentiality.
