Since 2010, Lisa has been the Director of the Strategies and Partnerships Branch of the Community and Health Services department, where she oversaw community investment allocations, strategic social policy, research and analysis, and strategic communications. She recently took on the role of General Manager, Paramedic and Seniors Services, providing operational oversight for paramedic services and the Region's two long-term care homes. Lisa has also worked for the provincial government: Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, Ministry of Community and Social Services, the cabinet office providing support to the Premier's Office, and with the management board. A week of special events to raise awareness about consent, Oct. 7 to 11

York University students, staff and faculty are invited to join the <u>Centre for Sexual Violence Response</u>, <u>Support & Education</u> (The Centre) as they raise awareness about consent during <u>Consent Week at York U</u>, Oct. 7 to 11.

"Through this week, we hope to continue fostering the ongoing dialogue of the importance of consent in our everyday lives as we navigate the world, both within campus and outside of campus," said Joanie Cameron Pritchett, director of Community Support & Services. "We invite all of our community members to join us as we navigate consent within a variety of disciplines. Consent week includes a multitude of events to reach out to our students, staff and faculty [including] discussions, training, workshops and lectures both on Glendon and Keele Campuses."

Consent Week will start with The Centre hosting a photo booth, art installation, art therapy session and a beading workshop, and end by cheering on the York Lion's Soccer Teams as they take on Laurier during Community Day Game. Throughout the week, The Centre will have a presence in the Upper Bear Pit on Keele Campus to raise awareness about consent and distribute free promotional items. There are limited spots at some events including the Art Therapy Session and Beading Workshop, so Pritchett advised that community members who are interested in attending should register early by sending an email to thecentre@yorku.ca.

This is the first Consent Week at York University. The idea was born from the positive feedback from successful previous training and education sessions that The Centre has provided for the community.

"In the past we've done many trainings/workshops with our community and met with various departments to provide information when invited," said Jessica Thyriar, education and training specialist for The Centre.

"We've had positive feedback, and always taken input from our community members that we need more awareness for our entire community of students, staff and faculty. That's why this year we were focused on creating an entire week of events."

By bringing in experts to provide insight and continuing to raise awareness around consent, The Centre hopes Consent Week at York U also helps raise awareness about the supports and services offered by their office, staff, peers and external partners.

"We've always been working to raise awareness around consent, but as the new term begins we wanted to include a variety of opportunities to engage with our external partners to learn, unlearn and be aware that support is always available should they need it," said Pritchett. "We're here for survivors on our campus, but also those who support survivors, engage in this type of work or for those who want more information."

Are you thinking of Graduate School?

This incentive award is to encourage our best undergraduates to apply for external awards and to consider attending graduate programs in the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies (LA&PS).

The LA&PS Undergraduate Incentive Award will be given to every York undergraduate student who (1) applies for a Scholarship from SSHRC, NSERC, CIHR or OGS <u>AND</u> (2) who is accepted and enrolls in a graduate program in LA&PS. Once you register into your graduate program in LA&PS, the \$1000 will be posted to your student account. Many of our best students do not apply for graduate awards that they may be eligible for because it's a lot of work to put together an application in your final year of undergraduate studies. We want to make that effort worth your time with a \$1000 Incentive Award.

President provides an update on the Markham Centre Campus

The following is a message to the University community from President and Vice-Chancellor Rhonda L. Lenton:

As you know, York University has been working to develop a path forward for our Markham Centre Campus (MCC) following the withdrawal of provincial capital funding for the project last October. We continue to believe that Markham provides an important opportunity to advance the University's priorities while bringing innovative academic programming to a diverse, growing and economically vibrant region.

On **Tuesday, Oct. 8**, a new business plan for the Markham Centre Campus was approved by the York University Board of Governors. This approval allows us to continue to advance the process for the MCC with the Government of Ontario and our partners in the city of Markham and York Region while restarting our collaborative planning around academic programs and governance with colleagues across the University.

This new campus will allow York University to serve the increasing growth needs in York Region by:

- accommodating the projected dramatic 34-per-cent increase by 2040 in the 18- to
 22-year-old population in York Region, the highest growth rate in the province;
- allowing prospective students in York Region to study closer to home while supporting the enrolment plans of several Faculties and schools;
- building on York's already thriving presence in the city of Markham (Innovation York, YSpace, IBM Innovation Space – Markham Convergence Centre) to solidify York's position as the provider of higher education in York Region, benefiting the University as a whole;
- providing additional space and facilities to support new programming and faculty complement renewal, while leveraging the surrounding Markham infrastructure;
- offering a wide range of degree programming focusing on digital technologies, entrepreneurship, new media and communications in response to the emerging labour market needs of York Region and Ontario.

Planning for the MCC will be incorporated into our broader institutional priorities and objectives, ensuring that we are able to leverage this strategic opportunity while also investing in our Keele and Glendon campuses to fully realize our mission and vision as a leading comprehensive and research-intensive university committed to access, connectedness, excellence and impact.



Foreign Service Officer - Post-Secondary Recruitment

This process will be used to staff numerous indeterminate (permanent) or term (temporary) positions. A pool of qualified or partially qualified candidates will be established and may be used to staff similar positions with various tenures (permanent, temporary) within Global Affairs Canada.

Positions to be filled: 100

The Canadian Foreign Service consists of four streams of work. As a Foreign Service Officer (FS), you will have the opportunity to enter the Department in one of the streams indicated below. All FS can expect to have assignments rotating between missions overseas and Canada throughout their career. While at Headquarters, the FS provide operational support to programs as well as analysis and advice to senior managers and the government in support of Global Affairs Canada's mandate and operations.

TRADE COMMISSIONER SERVICE (TCS)

Foreign Service Officers engaged in international business development are Trade Commissioners who assist members of the Canadian business community to navigate international markets and develop export and investment opportunities. They provide Canadian companies with key business insights and access to a network of international contacts. Officers in this area also negotiate and implement Canada's broad trade agreement network giving Canadian companies preferred access to diverse markets all over the world.

FOREIGN POLICY AND DIPLOMACY (FPDS)

Foreign Service Officers in the Foreign Policy and Diplomacy Service represent the foreign policy interests of Canada in countries and multilateral organizations across the globe. Through bilateral and multilateral diplomacy, advocacy, and the negotiation and implementation of international agreements, diplomats engage and influence international players to advance Canadian interests and values. They enhance social and cultural ties and promote international security and democratic development in support of global stability.

MANAGEMENT CONSULAR OFFICER (MCO)

Foreign Service Officers who are Management Consular Officers provide management and administrative support for our missions abroad. MCOs provide consular assistance to Canadians who are travelling, working and living abroad. This includes travel advice and assistance to individual consular clients and more broadly in the event of emergency situations, conflicts and natural disasters. They also manage programs to ensure that Canadian personnel and facilities around the world are secure and able to fulfill their mandate.

INTERNATIONAL ASSISTANCE (IA)

Foreign Service Officers in the International Assistance stream work with Canadian, multilateral, international and local partners to develop policies, and manage programs, in support of Canada's objectives in the field of international assistance. They also work to reduce the vulnerability of people in crises, such as during armed conflicts, acute food insecurity and natural disasters, by providing humanitarian assistance bilaterally and through multilateral institutions.
